Qualifications: A. A degree in Biomedical Engineering or Electrical and Electronic Engineering which is recognised by the Council of Registered Professional Engineers of Mauritius as qualifying for registration as a Registered Professional Engineer of Mauritius under Section 13 of the Registered Professional Engineers Council Act No. 49 of 1965, and as subsequently amended or an equivalent qualification acceptable to the Public Service Commission.

B. Candidates should be computer literate.

Candidates should produce written evidence of knowledge claimed.

Duties: Trainee Biomedical Engineers will be required to undergo and complete a period of training of at least two years by the end of which, they should have been registered as a Registered Professional Engineer of Mauritius in one of the fields mentioned at A above with the Council of Registered Professional Engineers of Mauritius under Section 13 of the Registered Professional Engineers Council Act No. 49 of 1965, and as subsequently amended, failing which their enlistment will be terminated.

During the training period, the Trainee Biomedical Engineers –

- (i) will work under the direct responsibility and supervision of a Biomedical Engineer (Health); and
- (ii) will not be allowed to decide or advise or report on, design or approve the designs of any engineering project.

On being registered as a Registered Professional Engineer of Mauritius with the Council of Registered Professional Engineers of Mauritius and on successful completion of the training, Trainee Biomedical Engineers will be considered for appointment to the grade of Biomedical Engineer (Health), as and when vacancies occur.
