This is the fruit of the hard work of an entire generation. The fruit of your hard work, dear members of the FCSOU.

Today, many among you enjoy much higher salaries and safer jobs at entry level or even professional level, as in comparison to your counterparts in the private sector.

There are many advantages that you benefit from. That have been won due to the several struggles of your Federation.

Today, this government is coming forward with more facilities that will surely improve your conditions of work.

Support us in this endeavor!

In this administrative system of ours, meritocracy is functioning. Whether you are a man or a woman or part of a minority group in society,

if you are worthy, you will be promoted.

I know for a fact that we have living examples here, of people entering at clerical levels and now working at management level.

Historically, I have been told, the **FCSOU** has to its credit various achievements that have reshaped the civil service, in particular

The reduction in the hours of work

The end of year bonus

The establishment of a permanent machinery for reviewing of pay and grading structures and conditions of service through the Pay Research Bureau

And the facilitation of negotiations between affiliates and the Ministries/Department.

I think it should continue in this path. When the reform will be completed, the employees of the State shall evolve in a more dynamic environment.

They will be empowered with the several tools that will enable them to increase their productivity and enjoy better job conditions.

The FCSOU will be part of Public Service 3.0.
